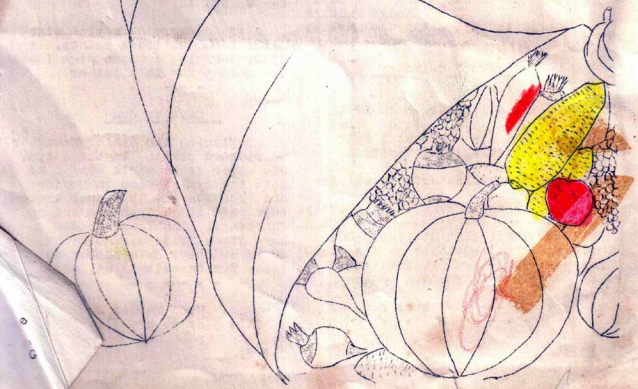

A new electric hot water heater is being installed in the basement. This will furnish hot water for the kitchen and for showers.

Delta's Water Supply

The eighth grade visited Delta's water plant on October 25. It was very interesting to see all the steps the water has to go through before it is good enough to drink.

Frist of all it is pumped from the reservoir through a screen so small fish and sticks will be taken from the water. Lime and alum are put in the water to make the unclean impurities settle. Carbon is also added for taste and odor.

Then it is ready for the settling basin. It stays in there about six hours.

After that it goes in the filter. They have two filters so when they clean one the other one can still be in operation. They have to be cleaned out every four or five days. It takes 14,000 gallons of water to clean one of the filters.

Then it is chlorinated a second time to be sure the bacteria are all dead.

The water is purified now and it is put into the clear well.

After it is put in there it is pumped up town. Mr. Farmon, the man that runs the plant, said that on Oct. 24 the people of Delta used 91,000 gallons of water. Usually it is 135,000 gallon per day and in the summer 200,000 gallons per day.

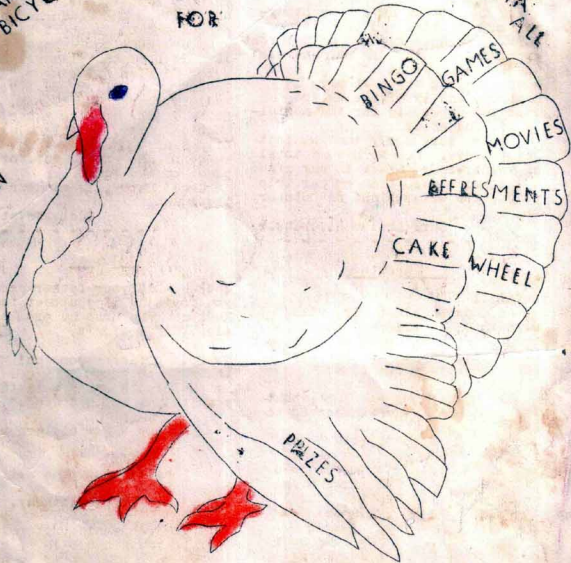
